The final event of the month was the dates meeting, this is reported in detail elsewhere in this issue, so suffice to say that some very interesting points were raised and discussed.

Chairman's Corner

Getting a winkle out of its shell was child's play compared to the opening few minutes at the Dates Meeting but after a few provocative remarks by Martin and Dennis thoughts began to become words and we had a very useful discussion on our past programme and some very helpful suggestions for the coming year.

Very briefly we can summarise thus:

Rallies - Not always fully subscribed, never oversubscribed with reserves waiting for a "drop out so that they can have a go. Novices are possibly put off by the fear that they will be shown up by the performance of the Expert class. Also an event of a 100 miles or more is rather a big chunk to take a first bite at. Suggested that two of our night rallies to be held during the next 12 months shall be for novices only, they will be on non damaging road surfaces, I say surfaces advisedly, as any road can be damaging if not treated with respect. The organizers can do nothing about the way you take a corner but they can make sure that the surfaces are good enough not to require a sump guard. The total mileage will not exceed 70/75 miles and will be run as prescribed at a true 30 m.p.h. average. If you keep wrong slotting and adding 2 or 3 miles every time don't blame the organizers if you have to average more than 30 m.p.h. to arrive at controls within your 30 minutes and 59 secs. allowance.

The other six rallies will be open to all with six entries reserved for Expert/Semi-experts and six for novices up to the closing date for entries. If the two divisions are not fully subscribed the organizer will increase the proportion of either section according to the entries in his possession. These six rallies will have a common finishing point which the novices will reach after 70/75 miles, the Experts will cover the same route but will take a loop to bring the mileage up to the 100/125 mile mark to make it a real might out. The sting will lie in this loop all

the marshalling resources will be concentrated on it just at a time when crews are getting tired and we will sort them out.

Lack of entries for driving tests and production car trials during the past year could be blamed on the weather which was a doubtful starter or a downright disappointment on each occasion. Better weather next year could bring an improvement, but it was also felt that quite a lot of members were completely new to motor club competition anddid not know enough about either type of event to risk having a go. We shall, therefore, in the next few issues, go into details as to how these events are run, how they are scored, what car preparation is necessary, what the chances are of damaging the car, etc. etc.

We hope that armed with this information, and better luck weatherwise, we shall see entries which will satisfy all organizers and make competition between members something worthwhile.

I was very disappointed that I could not join the party on the Club picnic at Castleton. It is very rare I feel under the weather, but this was one of those occasions. Those who did turn up enjoyed a first class day out, and we can use the route and venue again when not so many members are on holiday.
