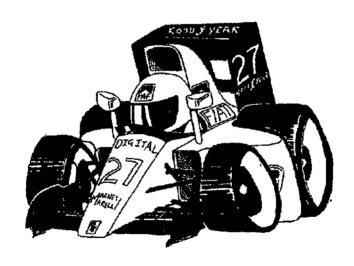

CHAIRMAN'S CHAT

Dear All,

Well, this month appears to have been the weather we've been waiting for, there's just not enough of it!

A new discipline never tried before began with an invitation to Rebecca Kemp and myself to conduct noise checks on cars at an International Rallycross Meeting over the weekend of 18/19th June up at Croft.

They have a different set of regulations to run under being organised under F.I.A. Regulations these stated that a 45 degree to the exhaust outlet half a metre away, the reading should not exceed 100 D.B.A. At 4500 R.R.M. this in itself was not a problem but written in to the Championship Regulations it quoted that at the sound level check there should be a piece of carpet 1.5 metres square under the exhaust outlet. Strange Regulation, and still some failed even with a Bedhouin Birthing Rug under the car!!

To follow this, to a country that appears to feel or accept that noise is acceptable from rally cars, in fact the more noise the better - **BELGIUM**. Having jumped on the 18.15 ferry from Hull to Zebrugge with Tom Whittaker and a Transit van we went to spectate on the 24 hours of Ypres. Having seen the start area etc., on Friday 24th June, we prepared for the spectating, looking at the stages first, indeed one criteria was to be early and get the best position.

This rally is so fast, it defies explanation - absolutely brilliant. Stage 2 saw our own Richard Moore of Buywell Retail Parks in his Subaru Legacy - it was not to be his event, retiring shortly afterwards. After two nights and a day of spectating we were full of praise for some stunning driving in both light and darkness. In fact, one driver said he was a second per kilometer faster in the dark. This onto the fact that there is NO room for errors on these tight and twisting roads.

Later this month on 31st July, there is another excellent Training Day in Dalby Forest, being organised by Malton Motor Club. Having been to the last one, it really was excellent and very, very realistic, including the accident staged for training. N E W S FROM THE RACMSA

National Lottery Rules

Any motor club application for National Lottery funds will have to be ratified by the appropriate regional association. This condition was unanimously approved by the RAC British Motor Sports Council at their May meeting. This will ensure that any grant to the club will fit into the regional development plan, which is an important part of the funding process.

The Lottery promises to create at least £100 million per year for sport. Motor sport can benefit, but there is not much time to prepare: application forms will be available in November and the first money will be paid out in February 1995. It is expected that about 30,000 applications for project money will arrive at the Sports Council on the opening day!

The government has laid down a number of guidelines; the most important is that the money must be spent primarily on capital projects; only in the most exceptional circumstances will funding be available for revenue purposes.

Commercial sporting activities are not eligible, although funds may be provided for non-profit-making activities which benefit the public. Projects will need to conform with a national or regional development plan for the appropriate governing body. All motor sport applications must therefore be made through the RACMSA.

At least 40% of requests are expected to be for £5,000 or less and it has been suggested that these will be automatically be supported provided the applicant can match funding from other sources on a 'pound for pound' basis.

Prince Michael Award of Merit

Nominations are now being sought for the 1994 Prince Michael Award of Merit. This is a prestigious personal award, made by the RAC British Motor Sports Council to a maximum of two recipients each year, in recognition of meritorious service to British motor sport.

Nominations should be made to the General Secretary of the RACMSA at Motor Sports House, before the end of August. A summary of the individual achievements or particular act of meritorious service must be included with any nomination for the

Cut-price hotels for motor club members

Forte Hotels have introduced major cuts in the cost of hotel accommodation for the holders of RACMSA competition licences and members of motor clubs recognised by the RACMSA.

The scheme, offering bed, breakfast and evening meal for only \$36 per head, applies at over 175 Forte hotels in England, Scotland and Wales.

Up to two children under 16 stay free when sharing a reom with their parent(s). In their own room, up to two children under 16 can pay only 75% of the full adult rate. A supplement of £10 per person per night is payable at 15 of the participating hotels.

A minimum of five (nonrefundable) vouchers can be bought at any one time. Each voucher is valid until 22 December 1994. Accommodation must be booked through the reservation centre (not direct with the hotel). The scheme celebrates Forte's sponsorship of Paul Stewart Racing, winners of the 1993 British Formula 3 and Vauxhall Lotus championships. PSR are taking part in both those championships during 1994, plus the FIA Formula 3060 international Championship.

Competitor safety

Competitors are reminded that the wearing of waterproofs — many such garments being highly flammable — over fire-resistant overalls cannot be recommended and is to be discouraged.

Club Sport Day at Donington

Entry-level motor sport will be on show to the public at a special event organised by the RAC Motor Sports Association on 2 October 1994.

Using a site kindly donated by Donington Circuit, the day will offer a chance for visitors to sample a whole range of disciplines, including trials, autotests, cross-country and autocross.

The day's activities are being coordinated by Les Needham. Suggestions and offers of help should be addressed to him at Motor Sports House.

Tour de France Act

The Road Traffic Regulations (Special Events) Act 1994 gained the Royal Assent on 3 May 1994.

The Act gives local authorities powers to close roads, to suspend traffic regulation orders and to redirect traffic to allow large sporting events to take place on public highways. Actual motor sport competition is specifically excluded from the new Act, although roads may still be closed for traffic management, use as a rally service area and other purposes.

PP Video certainly has a talent for finding rare film and much of it is well worth pulting on video, but it should try and be less ambilious in its attempts to produce documentaries.

Facts about...

- The tragic events in F1 this year have highlighted how even the best of us can have accidents, and it behoves us all to do our utmost to reduce the effects as far as is practicable. Unfortunately it is never possible to make our sport 100% safe and accordingly the majority of safety requirements are some form of compromise. They have to be practical, which includes being financially reasonable, and they have to be such that they don't unduly interfere with the nature of the sport.
- At circuits, a further compromise is caused by the large number of different activities catered for; what is suitable for single senters is not necessarily ideal for saloons, or motorcycles, or karts, or trucks. Similarly the equipment worn by the Fi driver would be prohibitively expensive for the newly qualified novice.
- The RACMSA lay down safety regulations for events, which have been formulated as the result of many years' experience, and which are constantly reviewed in the light of changing conditions. For many years circuits and venues in this county have been subject to regular inspections by the RACMSA Circuit

Safety and Environmental Inspector and regular reports are made to the RACMSA Safety Committee regarding these inspections.

- Statistics are notoriously fickle but the sport with the worst fatality record is fishing (a surprising number of people are drowned); rock climbing and horse riding also figure higher in the lists than motor sport, which gives a good indication of the value of the various safety regulations.
- Until a few years age it was simply accepted that motor sport was dangerous, and competitors took part at their own risk. Nowadays, various legislation, including "Health and Safety", and changing public attitudes have put a much greater onus on organisers of events to ensure that participants do not injure themselves, and thus organisers now have a greater duty of care than was the case in the past.
- It is for this reason that many of the newer Safety Regulations have been brought into the RACMSA Regulations.
- Many of the Safety items are rather tike insurance, one hopes they will never be needed, but when a disaster does occur, it is too late to decide that they are inadequate.
- Safety barriers at circuits and other permanent venues are primarily designed to protect spectators or

officials, and so often represent a compremise as far as protecting the competitor is concerned.

- In deciding what Safety equipment to purchase, always go for the best quality that you can afford. It could be YOUR life on the line.
- If you are involved in an accident, always renew Safety Harnesses, Crash itelmets (if appropriate) etc.
 Harnesses stretch in an accident and thus lose their effectiveness. Helmets may well be damaged or weakened internally where they cannot be seen.
 Roll-over bars may be stressed as a result of the forces applied to them.
- . The safety of competitors in Historic vehicles is causing much concern. Modern devices such as roll-over bars and safety barnesses can reduce the value of such a vehicle, and can also alter its read holding characteristics. However, these vehicles can have just as nasty an accident as more modern vehicles, and competitors are advised to seriously consider whether such devices should be fitted. Modern tyres and track surfaces can be much more "grippy" than those current when the vehicle was originally built, and can introduce a further possible hazard. · It is in everyone's interest to make
- It is in everyone's interest to make motor sport as safe as possible, and this can only be done by constant alertness.

First be safe

well, we all know that, and accept it - with one particular exception. While recognising the risk while you are on the track or special stage, how often do you consider safety before you start competing? Preparing the car, transporting the car and servicing the car prior and during an event, that's all kid's stuff is it?

Ours is not a magazine to preach, but taking a few sensible precautions can make a big difference. Recently, we were transporting our Project Mexico to the paint shop for a minor repair (rust, not accident!). A complete wally in a Fiesta caused us to hammer on the anchors for an emergency stop. The result was so severe, the straps holding the Mexico on the trailer snapped and the car slid forward and was only prevented from hitling the tow car by the tall jockey wheel! No great damage occurred but it made us

think. The straps weren't that old, but when had we last really looked at them to check condition? We have now bought some tougher new ones.

When on an event, you are always going to want to look under a car. No matter how little time you've got, always use axle stands to support the vehicle. You should never roll under a car balanced precariously on a single trolley jack. It's also worth considering taking some strong flat pieces of wood with you so you can support the jack and the supports; British motorsport always seems to have grassy service areas and with the rain we get, jacks and stands often just sink gently in the mud, which is both frustrating and potentially dangerous.

It's also worth carrying a spare hand-heid extinguisher and keeping it with your tool kit. A fantastic 'plumbed-in' extinguisher system isn' that much use for a small localised burn up. Also, think about wearing gloves as often as you can. Keep some over-shoes for those expensive race boots, or slick on

your tally trainers when servicing the car; far better that than slipping off the pedals when you next jump in the car.

And finally, First Aid. It makes a great deal of sense to do a course and pick up some esclut tips. Talk to your instructor about the specific needs that you might need. Hopefully, you'll never need to use any of it, but you never know.

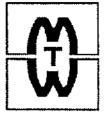

RETROSPECTIVE

From the pages of 'Trackrod' Magazine of July 1975.....

Nigel Drayton took our cover photograph - a somewhat blurred likeness of an Escort on our stage (Boltby) on the 75 Mintex Dales - driver is one Eric Jackson. Other photos depict SPY 44 of Jackson/Lloyd on 74 Crystal Stages and the old 'Anglebox' of Steve Lloyd on an autocross in 1966 (all vintage stuff is this!!)

New members were listed as Richard Ashcroft; Bob Chapman; Derek Lee (who?); John Spencer and Tom Tidswell.

The last named made a good start to his membership by presenting the Editor with a two-page report of the Michelin Foreign Car test day at Silverstone, courtesy of Dealer Opel Team!

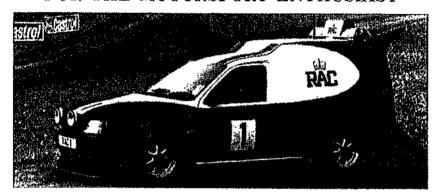
