EVENTFUL HISTORY

Short of something to read recently – well, I've always been reluctant to take out a sub to *Playboy* in case I failed the practical test – I browsed through the minute books of a typical club formed in the Midlands in 1950.

As I browsed I was struck by how many of the problems, major and minor, that the committee faced 50 years ago are often live issues today. For instance, there was interminable debate about the design of a badge and tie, the sort of debate you still get today over club clothing. Other social groups go through the same drama – we agonised endlessly in my hiking club over whether to have our bobbles in blue or beige.

Like many clubs in those days, the competition programme included rallies, trials and driving tests (as autotests were then called), one of which included a regularity test for which 'the winner's lady passenger shall receive a pair of nylon's'. Nylons... which must have meant suspenders...

Sorry, I got a bit distracted there. By July of their first year the committee was fretting about settling the following year's calendar, while there was concern over where some trophies were – they still go missing today.

It was clearly an ambitious club because Sammy Davies of the *Autocar* was invited to the Annual Dinner as was the

motoring correspondent of the local paper (you rarely see journalists invited today). After much debate the committee agreed to co-operate in a local road safety week, something clubs could well do today to enhance our image. And there were endless discussions about trying to find venues. So no change there then.

When the club was only a few months old there was some concern over the control of bank accounts, control which is still needed today, although the records don't record if this was connected with the next minute 'that on a vote of two thirds of the committee, members could be asked to resign or be expelled.'

On a brighter note, 70 entries were received for a sprint and a display of model cars was arranged for a shop window to help promote the club; you see plenty of displays today in building society windows for amateur dramatic societies, rarely one for a motor club...

In 1952 the club decided to support a resolution at the Annual RAC Conference of Clubs that 'the RAC Competitions Committee does not provide a sufficiently representative body to deal with the competition activities of non-specialised clubs. It was proposed that a regional representative should sit on the committee'. First rumblings of

Regional Associations perhaps?

Proving that there is little new under the sun, there was constant reference during the fifties to the woeful lack of marshals. A stern letter was sent to two members who left their marshals post at a Silverstone race meeting 'on more than one occasion' – this was after they'd been summoned before the committee and failed to satisfy with their explanation.

By 1955 it was being minuted that 'speeches at the annual dinner be cut as short as possible' (hear, hear) and 'should be limited to 4'. Good grief, they had stamina in those days. They had sense too because they also voted to become a limited company to protect club officials.

Plus ça change, plus ça change as they'd probably say in *Ecurie Cod Fillet* if they knew what it meant. Still a great sport though isn't it? *Stuart Turner*

Magherafelt wins Club of the Year Award

Magherafelt & District Motor Club won the national Alexander Forbes MSA Club of the Year Award. The award winners were:

Overall winner: Magherafelt & District Motor Club. The first time the award has gone to Northern Ireland. Magherafelt capitalised on the disruption to motor sport caused by Foot & Mouth to organise a rally car push, which benefited the Mid-Ulster Hospital by a splendid £10,000. The club has a clear recruitment policy and strong links with the local community. It plans to use the cash award to develop a six-mile asphalt rally stage with spectator-friendly areas.

Second overall: Series 3 Land Rover Owners Club. With a wide range of social and family activities supplementing its off road events, membership of over 1,200 grew during a difficult year. They undertook community activities (such as delivering 'meals on wheels' in bad weather and providing Land Rovers to assist in flooded areas), organised a run in September to mark the 30th anniversary of the Series 3 Land Rover, and made a donation to Greenpeace, who celebrated their 30th birthday at the same time.

Third overall: Ross & District Motor Sports Club. Having identified three strands for its future strategy as development, communications and information technology, this club (with a rising membership) drew up job descriptions for its officials to underpin its training

and recruitment. Being one of the few clubs in the UK to have their own clubhouse, an IT suite was installed for members. The club also have good community links with other local clubs and organisations.

Highly Commended: North Devon Motor Club and East Ayrshire Car Club.

MSA launches Junior Trials

The MSA has unveiled a brand new formula to allow children as young as eight to enjoy off road motor sport. The Junior Trials Vehicle (JTV) was launched at the Autosport Show in Birmingham.

The JTV is the result of two years' work by the Off Road Committee of the Motor Sports Council, who wanted a formula to introduce young competitors to trialling. Their objectives included safety, low cost and accessibility.

It has been agreed that the new vehicle will be based on a single-cylinder lawn tractor with manual transmission. No tuning or de-restricting of the engine will be allowed. The front axle will be free (using original mountings), but the chassis will remain unmodified. A full rollcage, head restraint and full safety harness will be mandatory.

Choosing a lawn tractor as the base vehicle ensures a vast choice of new and used machines and parts, a stable platform (due to its low centre of gravity) and a low maximum speed. Modifications will be strictly limited and mainly for safety, to make preparation of a JTV affordable and simple.

The MSA will develop the JTV during 2002, with regulations finalised for 2003. Two JTVs will be taken to rounds of this year's British Off Road Championship and other events, where potential competitors will

be able to have a go.

MSA Chief Executive Colin Hilton said: "The new formula enormously increases the range of disciplines which can benefit from attracting very young competitors. Until now, only kart racing and dragsters have been available for eight-year-olds; JTV offers youngsters a chance to develop the skills needed not only for trialling, but for every form of off road driving, including rallying.

"We look forward to running JTV events in 2003. Meanwhile, we hope that as many prospective competitors, parents, organisers and manufacturers will come and see the prototypes in action during the next few months, so that final regulations can be introduced with a minimum of unnecessary amendments."

MSA Directory goes online

After 14 years of publication, the MSA Motor Sports Directory, best known to most readers as the green pages in the Competitors' Yearbook, is going online as part of the MSA website.

A standard entry with logo and links to a company website and email, costs just £48. A premium entry for £150 allows for inclusion in up to six searchable categories and results in a mini-website which can be updated by the customer at any time.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Off-Road is the second largest discipline in Motor Sport, only just behind 'Rally' in the total number of events run.

In recent years the establishment of very successful championships has helped Off-Road grow, in particular through the British Off-Road Championship and the Hillrally Championship the sport as a whole has enjoyed increased publicity and interest from both inside and outside of motorsport.

Looking to the sports future and the problem all motorsport faces - 'how to attract youngsters in to and keep them in the sport' the Tyro (Latin for novice or beginner) Trial was introduced.

Slow to take off initially, Tyro Trials are now being run very successfully by many clubs and attracting through the regulations the "under age" 14-year-old drivers and families into off roading.

Rather than being left to stand and watch on the sidelines, they can now all take part in these events as well.

This move to ensure a strong future is now being followed up by the Off-Road Committee with the planned introduction of a Junior Off-Road Trials Formula; hopefully this will allow youngsters from as young as eight to start competing in special vehicles in off road trials.

Look out for more details on the Junior Off-Road Trials Formula from the MSA in the near future.

A-Z OF BRITISH GRAND PRIX CARS, David Hodges, Crowood Press, £25, ISBN 1 86126 339 2.

A fine companion to his earlier A-Z of Formula Racing Cars, this hefty hardback represents Hodges' last work. And it's a fitting legacy.

Though low on gloss, this unpretentious effort spreads a wide net, aiming to describe every GP single-seater ever built from 1906 to the end of the 2000 season, including those that never competed.

Layout has the distinct whiff of an encyclopedia, picture reproduction isn't too hot in places, and a few typos have crept in. Nit-picking is pointless though: this is a fabulous book and represents remarkable value.

FORD IN TOURING CAR RACING Top of the Class for Fifty Years. ISBN 1 85960 688 1. Graham Robson, Haynes, £19.99.

Worth it just for the pictures but the words are worth having to: Ford's tintop heyday was the '60s and '70s, where most of the images come from - three-wheeling Lotus Cortinas and V8 Falcons to giant-killing Twin Cam and FVA Escorts mostly run by Alan Mann Racing.

And there's lots on the hilarious factory-sponsored one-model (or was that banger) racing, plus Supervan.

Robson was around in those heady days, and this experienced Ford-watcher has talked to all the right people, including company and team bosses.

Supremacy would return with the Eggenberger Sierra Cosworth

RS500s, and a suitable chunk is devoted to this, but Robson does not gloss over the fact that the preceding 'XR4s' were really American-spec Merkurs, or that the first racing Mondeos were rear-drive and powered by Mazda V6s: it was just a question of how you read the rule book.

There's also a table of title wins, by model. Well written, with accessible layout and fine production standards, this is a value-for-money winner.

BACK FIRE a passion for cars and motoring. Alan Clark, edited by Robert Coucher, Weidenfeld & Nicholson. ISBN 0 297 60735 9. £18.99.

Combining unpublished extracts from the inimitable MP and car nut's diaries with columns he wrote in a variety of car magazines, *Back Fire* is an entertaining read that enthusiasts will enjoy dipping into.

Perhaps a little random as a cover-to-cover read, it does reveal some great anecdotes, such as the saga of Clark hogging the House of Commons car park or getting Jaguar to prepare his beloved XK120 for the Carrera PanAmericana before he chickened out.

A bit pricey for a fairly slim volume (hardback though), it does offer some great period photos of Clark with some of his favourite cars - at 17 behind the wheel of his Jaguar SS100, on the Continent in his vintage Rolls or at hillclimbs with his Beetle, later Porsche 356-engined. Who else would let his two rottweilers sleep on his C-type Jaguar bonnet? Good fun.

MARSHALS POST

Marshals do all sorts of jobs at circuits – from Assembly Area to Finish Line – but the marshals you will most often see are based at the marshals' posts around the circuit.

Each post is normally manned by an Observer, between one and three Flag marshals, an Incident Officer and an Incident Team made up of Incident Marshals, Course Marshals and Trainees.

There is usually only one Observer per post and they have overall responsibility for running the post and for safety.

Observers report any incidents to Race Control – usually by telephone, but sometimes by radio. If the incident is serious, the Observer might ask for a race to be stopped or an emergency vehicle to be brought out, if there is a problem with a

car, they might suggest a scrutineer takes a look and they will also report any infringement of the rules, any spins and any minor impacts.

Once a session is over the Observer may hand in a written report to the Clerk of the Course or the Chief Observer, when he or she drives round the circuit to check everything is ready for the next session to run. Observers may also be called upon to give evidence to any disciplinary hearings.

Flag Marshals work closely with the Observer and one of them will usually take control if there is no Observer on post. Flag Marshals are experienced marshals who will make their own decisions on which flags to display, but at major International meetings they may be in direct radio contact with Race Control – reporting when flags are displayed and receiving instructions from the Race Director.

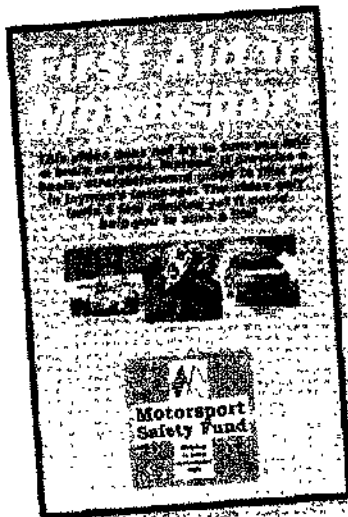
The team that deals with vehicles involved in incidents is

led by an Incident Officer and made up of Incident Marshals, – who are themselves experienced marshals – Course Marshals, who will usually have been marshalling for at least a year, and Trainees.

Incident and Course Marshals will often be able to deal with incidents on their own, but if something more significant occurs, it's the Incident Officer's job to work out a plan of action, communicate it to the team and then stand back to ensure the plan is working safely and effectively – however, when marshalling numbers are low, you will often see an Incident Officer taking a more "hands on" role.
