CHAIRMAN'S CHAT - MARCH 2003

I have now had verbal confirmation from the MSA that they intend to support ALL applications for NEW (as in brand new) radio sets on the new FM frequency. This does not, however extend to new applicants (only to those replacing existing licenced sets). Sadly the support will not be available in year 1 (i.e 2003) and will be spread over the next year or two.

So – assuming Committee agree we will determine the level of subsidy TMC are willing to give and make a "best guess" regarding the ultimate MSA contribution. Please do not hold me to this but I anticipate around £85 in total being available, and if we do not get many "new" applications (none so far!!) then we can subsidise everyone. This means I will need a cheque for around £165 (£210 plus vat = approx £250, less £85 = £165). We must get these sets before the end of May and will need to order well before that – say end of March. Please start allocating funds now if you want to proceed! I will confirm the price as soon as possible – so please ask!

Hopefully you will all be out on the Lookout, either as an Official or Competitor, and as the rally year gets under way lets have some good competition, including our own "Perfect 10" Championship.

Something different?

The Fantasy Sport Midland Speed Championship;

proved to be one of the most closely fought championships in the country in 2002. After 21 rounds the top three all had 8 maximum scores and the championship would be decided by the tie breaker at the last round at Curborough. John Palmer in the Puma powered Westfield just pipped reigning champion David Marshall in the Road Modified Peugeot 205 Gti to become the 2002 Champion.

With 159 drivers registered for the championship in 2002 and 116 competitors already registered for the 2003 Fantasy Sport Midland Speed Championship, this goes to show the level of competition and the success of the championship to date and with a new scoring system for the 2003 championship designed to keep things even closer we have a thrilling season in prospect.

The Fantasy Sport Midland Speed Championship is made up of 22 rounds at different sprint and hillclimb venues in the Midlands, Wales and Yorkshire and with only your best 8 scores to count it means you don't have to travel great distances or compete at every round to be in with a chance.

There are classes for all types of cars from standard road cars up to ex F1 powered single seater racing cars with the classes further separated by cubic capacity to give everyone the opportunity to win their respective class

LOOKING OUTWARDS

aybe we've been looking in the wrong direction, inwards not outwards, when trying to analyse the reasons for falling interest in F1.

Tracks neutered? Maybe. But not that much and a generation that has never enjoyed, say, the old 'Ring in its full pomp can hardly mourn.

Team orders? Nothing new there. And if you think manufacturers will give them up completely, well, just don't pay too much if a nice man offers to sell you Big Ben when you're out without your carer.

The cars are boring? Race cars haven't gone sideways for ages so that can't be the reason for the falloff.

So if the 'show' hasn't changed that much, what has? I reckon audiences and their arritudes have, and quite rapidly over recent years. Attitudes to technology for instance. People now take hi-tech for granted, they're almost bored with it and assume anything's possible. They've invented a mobile phone that sings, dances and cooks a full English breakfast? Really...zzzzzzzz.

Now add in another change in public attitudes – the demand for immediacy and constant action, which has even led to scenes in TV soaps becoming briefer to stop people zapping off. In sport, when Tiger Woods is on the course, every shot offers what could perhaps be called a 'moment of interest' to hold attention, similarly every time Beckham kicks a ball. In contrast, although the first few minutes of a GP are far more exciting than any other moment in sport (even I must admit, more exciting than a Dellow in full cry on the Lands End Trial), you have to agree that the rest can often be an action-free zone for the casual viewer.

Watch almost every other sport to ours, and you can see the players' faces, count every bead of sweat; you can even tell what pleasantries soccer players are exchanging with the ref when booked. Motorsport? Difficult to tell team cars apart let alone team mates and you certainly can't see facial expressions.

So if our technology doesn't impress and we lose out to other sports offering more excitement and a greater feeling of involvement, should we panic? Of course not. The sport has had its ups and downs over the years and can come strong again but I think that instead of looking inwards, up our own exhaust pipes, we must look outwards. Start for instance by asking 100 people going in to the next few races or rallies what the fastest lap or stage time was the

previous year. I'll bet no more than 2 will know (both will be wearing anoraks). So what? So it suggests that absolute speeds are not that important and if cars were several seconds a lap slower nobody would mind all that much. Then think how costs could tumble through adding those seconds. Trickle the savings downwards and the whole of motorsport would benefit.

The reduction in the hi-tech allowed in F1 makes a significant start, but to avoid falling out of fashion like the old time music halls did, in future motorsport will have to constantly review what its customers want, infuriatingly fickle though they may be with their changing tastes. And by customers I mean the people who watch on TV or pay to spectate, not sponsors, because without the former there won't be the latter. Stuart Turner

Data Protection

If your club holds records of members either manually or on a computer system, there may be an implication with the various Data Protection Acts.

This information updates the advice provided in Guideline 5 of the MSA Motor Club Manual.

National Plan

The MSA has recently released its National Development Plan. Too large to detail here, a summary of the main points follows.

- To encourage a general awareness of motor clubs and motor sport events.
- To develop initiatives to encourage the participation of target groups, especially women, families, youngsters, disabled people and minority groups.
- In tandem with the development of the sport, we will provide opportunities to acquire social and life skills.
- To reduce the dependency on 'temporary-use' venues through the development of new dedicated motor sport centres.
- To adapt existing national training and coaching initiatives to best suit the needs of club level motor sport.
- To accommodate and encourage new automotive technology and safety-related development.
- The United Kingdom must seek to maintain its respected position as the heartland of world motor sport.

KARTING

It may be seen as a starting point in motor sport and inexpensive club racing, but make no mistake about it karting is a real hot-bed of action when it comes to finding the odd fraction or so—the winning edge.

Sneaky rocket fuels, jungle juice to soften tyres, and all manner of illicit mods to engines have been picked up over the years making it a sport where tight scrutineering and close attention to detail are all important.

There are classes like the top Formula A where just about anything goes. But in virtually every other there are tight controls to make the racing as close as possible and keep costs to a minimum.

Indeed the latest classes like the TKM 4-stroke make use of engines which are sealed at the factory and must only be returned there for servicing to guarantee that everyone has exactly the same equipment.

At championship events tyres are held in parc ferme, sometimes even fuel tanks, so there can be no chance of them being doctored.

At club level of course not quite the same levels are operated... but very close attention is still made to the engines especially in classes like the largest – TKM 2-stroke – where every engine has only the very smallest amount of mods allowed.

It may give the scrutineers grey hair but it helps produce very good drivers!

MERCEDES & BENZ AT INDY. George Wingrad available from Motorbooks. £59.95. ISBN 0 97168982 01.

Regular visitors to the Festival of Speed will be aware of Wingard's outstanding collection of Edwardian racers. His passion runs deep and this is his second self-published book, From Barney Oldfield's Benz to the Penske team's failure to qualify in 1995. Wingard balances insightful story with a wealth of illustrations, and highlights the fascinating hybrids such as Al Boyle's Hispano V12-powered brute and Ioel Thorne's W154 with sparks 'six'. This landscape book is packed with wonderful photographs and the perils of early Indy action are luridly illustrated by the shots of Charles Merz' 1909 smash. Just 500 copies have been printed: guaranteed to be collectable.

BENTLEY-LIGHTER MOMENTS WITH OUR HEAVY METAL. Published by the WO Bentley Memorial Foundation. £16.50 including p&p; tel: 01844 208233.

Car club journals are packed with gems only seen by members. The WO Bentley Memorial Foundation had the inspired idea of compiling a selection of humorous Bentley-related nuggets in one compact volume. The work of Red Daniels, WH Charnock, 'Steady' Baker and cartoonist Brockbank are packed into this handy 185-

page title. Bentley drivers have no trouble laughing at their stereotypes and section topics range from 'how to get started' to 'the problems of ageing membership'. Small Ad by Charnock is typical: 'Improverished motor has to sell, one owner driver, grand old lot, smokes far too much but goes like hell; blood pressure, seven hundred, hot.'

JAGUAR AT LE MANS -Every race, car and driver, 1950-1955. Paul Parker, Haynes. £25. ISBN 1 85960 632 6.

This celebration of the big cat's Le Mans performances shows what good picture research can do. It's packed with great images of XK120s Cs, Ds, lightweight and low-drag Es and Jaguar's return in the '80s, beginning with Group 44's lovely XIR-5s and culminating with the eventual victory with the XJR-9 in '88. The fascinating pictures lead you through the pits, scrutineering, on-track and on to the podium, but a favourite is the works team in a trio of Ctypes roating into a transport café on the way home in '53. The only complaint lies in Haynes' usual sober design effort.

The text is fact-packed yet accessible in a rigorously chronological format. There is a detailed appendix of runners, riders and results at the end, and comprehensive index makes it a fine reference. An absolute bargain.

MARSHALS POST

We started talking about changes to the 'Blue Book' - UK motor sport's 'Bible,' last month.

Let's look at a few more changes that affect marshalling in one way or another.

One important change is to the sticker that is used to indicate a competitor has a medical condition or disability. It used to be an orange circle with a 'D' in the middle, but it has been changed to a blue circle with a 'D'.

Obviously, marshals need to take extra care when helping a competitor with a medical condition or disability.

Remember, if there are two competitors in the car, the sticker should be on the door closest to the competitor with the condition or disability and remember too that the sticker may also be used to indicate an individual is

taking blood thinning drugs.
Only the Chief Medical Officer
will know, so take particular
care to control any bleeding if
you have to assist a competitor
with a 'D' sticker on their door.

The Blue Book introduces a new Rally Competition, called a Rally Time Trial. There aren't many details about just what a Rally Time Trial is, but the Blue Book does say that no passenger is to be curried, so Rally Time Trials look as though they could be anything from a Gravel Sprint to a Multi-Use Stage Rally, run without a navigator.

The other main changes in rallying are additional responsibilities for marshals safety for Stage Commanders and the introduction of a 'Spectator Safety Officer.'

The Stage Commander is now responsible for ensuring there are 'an adequate number of marshals,' who are in locations where they are not 'exposed to significant risk' and who are 'accompanied by experienced

colleagues' if they lack suitable experience themselves.

The new Spectator Safety Officer will be responsible for accommodating spectators in 'suitable areas,' and arranging appropriate access to those areas and preventing them from going elsewhere.

There is also an important change in the regulations for competitors covering 'OK' and 'SOS' boards. In the past they simply had to report that they had seen an OK or SOS board at the stage finish. They still do that, but, if they see an SOS board, they must also stop at the next official radio point and report its location, in addition to telling the finish crew.
